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2013 was certainly an exciting and challenging year for Salvation Farms. Our programs continue to grow and become stronger all the time. The Vermont

Commodity work at the SE State Correctional Facility is expanding and we are getting closer to the financial goal that will pay for the renovation of the building on the property. Program evaluations collected from the inmates make it clear that there are significant benefits beyond the reduction of fresh-food waste on farms.

The Gleaning Collective has four Member Organizations and we know this will be a very productive season for each. We have been hard at work building and bring to life the Gleaners Interface, an online tool to support gleaning across Vermont. We are excited to launch the Interface this spring.

You may have seen us on the road as we were able to purchase a truck through the combination of a grant, restricted donations, and a loan. Theresa has become a successful grant writer, finding a wide variety of funders impressed with our vision and the work they see occurring within communities across Vermont. Funders appreciate the approach that Salvation Farms is taking as we are creatively building systems that interconnect the programs and services that already exist in communities, not simply building another program.

Salvation Farms is at a pivotal time in our development. We must expand our staff by two this year to support our organization's growth and expand our services in Vermont. This is always a scary time for an organization, but we will move forward with confidence that the financial support exists to continue building food system resilience in Vermont. It is with great thanks to you for your commitment to our work that we will make these growth steps with focused dedication.



**Salvation Farms' mission** is to increase resilience in Vermont's food system through agricultural surplus management. Our mission is achieved by fostering collaborative, cross-sector partnerships that engage and utilize available resources, skills and knowledge to create efficient practices for managing Vermont's farm surplus.

### We are driven by three primary goals:

- 1. Reduce food waste on Vermont farms
- 2. Decrease our dependence on food from afar
- 3. Increase citizen appreciation for and understanding of our state's agricultural heritage and future

We are deeply rooted in the philosophy that farms are, were and always will be our salvation; small, diversified farms are the cornerstones of healthy, wholesome and stable communities and cultures. Salvation Farms led the Rutland Area Farm & Food Link's (RAFFL) gleaning program, the Glean Team, through pre-season farm visits and an overhaul of their operational systems. We provided staff training and support throughout the season, assisting with building program budget projections and identifying assets in the community to support the Glean Team's activities. As a result, their program saw a 25% increase in gleanings and a 99% increase in volunteer involvement.

Exploring an expansion of the Intervale Center's gleaning program to serve the greater Chittenden County region through farm visits led to four collaboratively coordinated gleans at Yates Family Orchard. More than three dozen volunteers including UVM students, AmeriCorps VISTA Members, and City Market Members contributed an excess of 200 hours resulting in 19,730 pounds of apples. The apples were shipped to the SESCF for packing by the Vermont

Commodity Program crew.

In our journey to stabilize, expand, and professionalize gleaning in Vermont through identifying resources that will create statewide connectivity, we suc-



cessfully engaged the first ever incarcerated work crew in the activity of gleaning in Vermont. A crew of ten men gleaned 7,090 pounds of winter squash and 466 pounds of peppers from High Mowing Organic Seeds production fields. Salvation Farms believes that a strong relationship with the Vermont Offender Work Program

will be an essential component to creating responsive farm surplus management programs.

We coordinated a glean at Pete's Greens with students from Sterling College and the Vermont Foodbank that yielded more than 1,500 pounds of summer squash. After






the harvest, a dozen students joined Salvation Farms to create minimally processed, frozen Vermont Commodity products.

This year at the SE State Correctional Facility (SESCF) we engaged 22 inmates and received 85,250 pounds of potatoes, winter squash, apples, carrots, onions, and rutabaga. Majority of crops were transported to and from SESCF by Black River Produce. Salvation Farms also transported 14,325 pounds to several sites throughout the year with our new company truck. The Vermont Commodity product, cleaned and packed at SESCF, was provided to the following food access sites/institutions: Bellows Falls Our Place Drop-In Center, Boston Area Gleaners, Keene Community Kitchen, Lamoille Community Food Share, SESCF Meal Program, Springfield Family Center, Trinity Church Food Shelf, Willing Hands, Windsor Schools, and the Vermont Foodbank.







## Will you list the work experience and any certifications/trainings you receive while on the Vermont Commodity Crew on your resume?

"Yes, so they would see that even though I'm locked up I'm still learning and want to be a big help to the community when I get out. All the training that comes out of this would help me further, to have a better chance of success on the street."

# Did you learn anything that you didn't expect to?

"Yes, I never realized the amount of safety that goes into a successful operation. Everything has its place and everyone has their task. Without proper training of SOPs (Standard Operating Procedures) everything can go wrong."

Minimally processed product development, part of the Vermont Commodity Program, continued at the Vermont Food Venture Center with summer squash and bell peppers. In total, 425 pounds were processed into 148 packages appropriate for food shelf distribution and 97 packages appropriate for prepared meal site use. Seventeen volunteers were engaged on two different days contributing 70 hours to process these gleaned veggies for the purpose of continued product development and end user testing.


