
From our successes - of which we've had many this past year - our small organization projects much growth and many challenges this year. From these challenges we will grow in strength and focus.

We send our Annual Report to you – in thanks and in anticipation of your participation in our mission and vision. We honor your dedication to changing the way we choose to feed ourselves.




\$21,052 of the above expenses are fundraising related
